





- 8 sites in Upper Carson River watershed
- March, June, August, and September
- Trained to collect:
 - water temperature
 - dissolved oxygen
 - pH
 - conductivity
 - turbidity
- 19 years of data
 - AWG Annual Water Quality Objectives Report
 - California Environmental Data Exchange Network (CEDEN)



Site 1 is at 75% vegetation cover as of July 2023


Site 2 had some extensive damage due to high flows


Project Goals

- Relocate sewer infrastructure out of the floodplain
- Restore the natural stream channel and floodplain
- Provide public access and recreation features



Harmful Algal Bloom Monitoring Red Lake

- Partnership with Lahontan Regional Water Quality Control Board
- May through November (weather dependent), starting in 2019




